Message from Nemaha County Hospital's CEO

Welcome to another edition of the Nemaha County Hospital Annual Report. I was reading the message that I wrote for last year's annual report and it was all about the remodel of our outpatient area. That remodel is complete, and we are beginning to remodel the rest of the space in the hospital. This remodel will be minor. We are just changing the floor and wall surfaces in most of the building. Things will be in a bit of disarray for a time, but I think you will like the finished product. Please read the local paper and listen to the radio to keep updated on how to access the facility as we move from phase to phase of this remodel.

In 2000, before I arrived at Nemaha County Hospital, the residents of the county voted on a bond issue of \$4.75 million to remodel the hospital. That bond issue passed by a two to one margin and the debt was to be repaid over the next twenty years.

When I arrived in July of 2002 this remodel was about two thirds complete and the hospital had \$4.75 million in debt on its books. The interest on this debt is an allowable expense under the Critical Access Hospital program, which means that the federal government paid at least part of the interest on that debt. The principle was our responsibility.

Under the direction of the Board of Directors we refinanced those bonds twice. Once in 2004 and again in 2014, both times to take advantage of better interest rates. We also paid off one year of interest and principle early.

You may recall that we started another remodeling project in 2010 and completed it in 2012. That remodel cost us approximately \$7.75 million. We were able to pay for that remodel out of our cash reserves, meaning we did not have to incur any more debt.

Through judicious guidance by the Board of Directors and the wonderful work of the staff, we have been able to keep our operating margin in the black, which allows us to continue to make improvements to the facility, purchase the equipment and supplies we need and provide excellent salaries and benefits to our staff.

I am very proud to inform you that, as of July 2019, Nemaha County Hospital is debt free! We appreciate the confidence that the residents of this county placed in us when they agreed to take on debt to improve the hospital nineteen years ago. I think we have proven ourselves worthy of that confidence by retiring that debt and not assuming any additional debt. I don't believe you can find many hospitals in this state in this enviable situation.

Thanks for your confidence in Nemaha County Hospital when you voted for the bond issue in 2000 and thanks for supporting us since that time! We will continue to strive to provide "Quality Care – Every Time" in the years to come.


Technology Makes Life Easier for Patients

In June of 2019, Nemaha County Hospital began supporting Health Records on iPhones to make it easier for patients to see their available medical data from multiple providers whenever they choose. Patients can have medical information from participating institutions organized into one view, covering allergies, conditions, immunizations, lab results, medications, procedures and vitals. They can also receive notifications when their data is updated.

Another way a patient can easily access their medical information is through our website. The Patient Portal is an online resource that allows you to log on in a safe, secure and private manner to see your medical records or pay a bill anytime, day or night. Simply register using your email address or ask a staff member to help you get registered.

In the medical environment there are times when forms need to be completed to get things accomplished. The education page on our website has links to many of these forms, from Power of Attorney to Advanced Directive, and you can simply fill them out and deliver them to the department that needs them. There are also many instruction sheets for things like surgery preparation and diabetes medication.



Outpatient Department

The Outpatient Department at Nemaha County Hospital is now fully remodeled! This project was approximately a 5-month process and one with which we are very satisfied and appreciative. The project started with the installation of a new HVAC system which now provides us with a very comfortable climate year round. All of our lighting was replaced with LED lights which has brightened up the department making it look and feel inviting. 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Local Emergency Services Providing Quality Care

In May of 2006, Nemaha County Hospital was designated as a Basic Level Trauma Center. This designation is not easily achieved and requires the entire Emergency Response Team working collaboratively to standards developed by the College of American Surgeons. The local EMS squads (Auburn, Cooper Nuclear Station, Johnson, Nemaha, and Peru) are integral to the success of our Trauma Team. Since the beginning they have participated in monthly Performance Improvement meetings and provided valuable insight to improve the trauma system for Nemaha County.

In January of 2019, on the recommendation of the local squads, Nemaha County Hospital implemented a monthly drill to refine the "handoff procedure" between squad and Emergency Room staff. Our goal was to enable the squads to rapidly report vital patient information to ensure continuity of care and allow ER staff to quickly assess and treat trauma injuries. This standardized process has led to improved treatment and transport of trauma victims in Nemaha County. We are confident that the Nemaha County Trauma Team will strive to advance the care for trauma victims and continue "Giving our best, so you can Live your best."

Securing Your Safety

A priority of Nemaha County Hospital is to ensure a safe and protected environment for our patients, our staff and our community. This past year we were able to participate at a national level to increase our safety risk knowledge and preparedness.

In December of 2018, we hosted a Table Top Exercise that brought together 35 multidisciplinary leaders from county, state and national organizations to discuss our preparedness for an active shooter situation. The discussion was facilitated and led by Steve Marin, Training and Exercise Coordinator, from the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (formerly the Office of Homeland Security). From this exercise, we were able to gain valuable knowledge and guidance in our response to an active shooter.

In April of 2019, we benefited from a three-day facility infrastructure survey conducted by Greg Hollingsead, Protective Security Advisor, Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency. This survey evaluated the security of our facility from outside threats. From this evaluation we have implemented recommendations to increase the safety of our facility with exterior lighting, decreased facility door access and increased staff awareness of potential threats.

Nemaha County Hospital's commitment to providing a safe and protected environment for our patients, our staff, and our community is ongoing. We have planned exercises that will continue to increase the level of readiness so we are better prepared for any emergency.

Quality Care Through the Years

Nemaha County Hospital has served the community since May 1, 1963. The physicians and staff have been there over the years to safely deliver children, immunize and educate citizens, care for parents and grandparents, perform lifesaving surgeries and relieve suffering and pain. One thing has remained true through all the years, the promise of Quality Care...Every Time.

In 1960 a steering committee was formed to research and propose a plan for a new hospital. A bond issue was placed on the ballot and a slogan contest, with a \$5 prize, was held. The winning slogan was "The Nemaha County Hospital is not a want! It's a necessity" and the bond issue passed. Nemaha County Hospital was born. There were 26 beds and a 69% occupancy rate the first year.

As the need and the county continued to grow, additional beds were needed and in 1970 another wing was built bringing beds up to 44, including four ICU beds. New administrative offices were also added. In 1974, space for an ambulance and maintenance building, as well as the new Physical Therapy unit, was created. Improvements in the kitchen, dining, laundry and emergency room entrance were also made—all financed by the hospital's operating funds.

In the 80's, a helicopter pad was added as well as a new Radiology Department, a LifeLine Emergency base unit, mobile units for CT services, Nuclear medicine, Mammographys and Ultrasound equipment. This growth continued into the 90's with a mobile MRI, a Cardiac Rehabilitation Center, along with many specialties such as ophthalmology, podiatry, and Ear, Nose and Throat.

The 2000's brought hospital remodels and annual inspections to make sure NCH operated at the highest federal and international standards.

Advances in healthcare have continued to bring about growth and change for Nemaha County Hospital and we will continue to make improvements and updates throughout the years in order to meet the healthcare needs of our community.

NCH Core Action Values

At Nemaha County Hospital, we believe that our Core Action Values are powerful shapers of our organizations culture. Testing the Future

Currently, we have 5 full-time employees in the lab. Lexa Posadas, MLS, keeps the cardiac and blood gas analyzers current with quality control and inventory. She is also responsible for keeping track of our test kit inventory.

Presley Galloway, MLS, completed her masters in Applied Genomics from the University of Connecticut with a 4.0 GPA and did the research for our new blood culture incubator as her Masters project. Presley takes care of the coagulation and hematology analyzers.

Hillary Edwards, MLT, is the key operator for the chemistry analyzer. She is training the rest of the staff on calibrating the multiple tests performed on the analyzer which is an additional step in quality assurance to ensure our laboratory is releasing quality chemistry results.

As an MLT, Jeff Bruns watches over our Blood Bank department. He created an NCH patient Blood Bank history spreadsheet and also takes care of the VIDAS instrument which tests for Procalcitonin.

Barb Jenkins, PBT, continues to excel as a phlebotomist for the laboratory. She is a great representative of the laboratory and won the 2019 Nemaha County Hospital Caring Kind employee of the year.

Diane Kettelhake, MT, lab manager at Nemaha County Hospital focuses on bringing the NCH laboratory up to current standards with written procedures located on the intranet. Two new procedures have been brought into our laboratory which has cut costs by two-thirds and sped up the turnaround time. We are now testing for RSV and, as of September 2019, our department is incubating our blood cultures in the laboratory which provides information to our medical staff in as little as 12 hours. Diane has also written Individualized Quality Control Plans for Procalcitonin, D-Dimer, Serum HCG, Blood Culture Incubation and Arterial Blood Gas testing.






WHERE THE MONEY WENT IN 2018
