RE: Daily COVID-19 Update

Good morning and thanks for reading this update. I don't have much to share with you today except for the statistical information. Cases continue to rise at an alarming rate in the southern states and it appears that cases are increasing at a gradual rate across the Midwest. Please be cautious as you venture out in public. I believe that we need to be more cautious than we were a month ago.

As of 9:00 this morning there were 17,328,238 cases in the world. Yesterday there were 17,061,855. There have been 673,936 deaths. Yesterday there had been 667,808 deaths.

In the United States there are now 4,495,612 positive cases, 152,082 deaths and 54,644,715 people that have been tested. Yesterday there were 4,428,896 cases, 150,733 deaths and 53,825,445 people that had been tested. There were 66,716 new cases diagnosed in the U.S. yesterday and 1,349 deaths. 10,000 of the new cases were discovered in Florida, 8,000 in California and 9,200 in Texas.

In Nebraska there are now 25,766 cases and there have been 328 deaths. Yesterday there had been 25,442 positive cases and 324 deaths. That makes 344 new confirmed cases identified since yesterday and 156 of the new cases were in Douglas County. 266,893 people have been tested in the state. Yesterday 264,033 people had been tested. We now have had eighteen confirmed cases in Nemaha County, six in Pawnee County, eighteen in Richardson County, eleven in Johnson County and thirty-eight in Otoe County. These are the numbers of cases in each county as reported by the Southeast District Health Department. 10,050 of the Nebraska cases are in Douglas County. There have now been 1,701 confirmed cases in Hall County, 939 cases in Dawson County and 1,896 cases in Dakota County. There are now 78 cases in Gage County and 2,967 cases in Lancaster County. There have been 91 positive cases and one death in the Southeast District Health Department area.
