RE: Daily COVID-19 Update

Good morning and thanks for reading this update. The number of new cases of COVID-19 in Iowa surged yesterday to almost 1,500 new cases. The number of new cases in Nebraska is remaining steady, but the disturbing thing is the increase in new cases in this area. The number of new cases is increasing at a much faster rate than a month ago. Please do what you can to mitigate this.

Nemaha County Hospital will be staffing a Test Nebraska site next Tuesday, September 1st from 10:00 until noon. Thanks to everyone that volunteered to help with this effort. Please see flyers and social media for additional information.

As of 9:00 this morning there were 24,495,232 cases in the world. Yesterday there were 24,203,260. There have been 832,484 deaths. Yesterday there had been 826,418 deaths.

In the United States there are now 5,870,185 positive cases, 180,862 deaths and 75,301,306 people that have been tested. Yesterday there were 5,823,923 cases, 179,743 deaths and 74,549,129 people that had been tested. There were 46,262 new cases diagnosed in the U.S. yesterday and 1,119 deaths.

In Nebraska there are now 33,101 cases and there have been 391 deaths. Yesterday there had been 32,727 positive cases and 386 deaths. 374 new confirmed cases have been identified since yesterday and 151 of the new cases were in Douglas County. 348,575 people have been tested in the state. Yesterday 344,760 people had been tested. We now have had sixty-two confirmed cases in Nemaha County, ten in Pawnee County, thirty-one in Richardson County, twenty-one in Johnson County and ninety-two in Otoe County. These are the numbers of cases in each county as reported by the Southeast District Health Department. 13,095 of the Nebraska cases are in Douglas County. There have now been 1,823 confirmed cases in Hall County, 995 cases in Dawson County and 1,977 cases in Dakota County. There are now 125 cases in Gage County and 3,796 cases in Lancaster County.
