RE: Daily COVID-19 Update

Good morning and thanks for reading this update. Sources that I listen to are telling me that there is going to be another surge of COVID-19 in this country this fall. Now, this is pure speculation, but all indicators point to this happening. If we all do what we know are the right things to do to prevent a pandemic, this surge will not happen. But, we have not proven that we are capable of that yet.

Worldwide, there is another surge of cases in Europe, particularly in Spain and France. The United Kingdom is also surging but to a lesser degree. Italy had a bad surge earlier this year but they seem to have gotten things under control.

As of 9:00 this morning there were 32,279,835 cases in the world. Yesterday there were 31,932,867. There have been 983,865 deaths. Yesterday there had been 977,453 deaths.

In the United States there are now 6,980,351 positive cases, 202,827 deaths and 98,481,026 people that have been tested. Yesterday there were 6,935,799 cases, 201,920 deaths and 97,459,742 people that had been tested. There were 44,552 new cases diagnosed in the U.S. yesterday and 907 deaths.

In Nebraska there are now 42,731 cases and there have been 462 deaths. Yesterday there had been 42,278 positive cases and 462 deaths. 453 new confirmed cases have been identified since yesterday and 120 of the new cases were in Douglas County. 434,369 people have been tested in the state. Yesterday 431,102 people had been tested. We now have had 124 confirmed cases in Nemaha County, 14 in Pawnee County, 59 in Richardson County, 41 in Johnson County and 146 in Otoe County. These are the numbers of cases in each county as reported by the Southeast District Health Department. 15,615 of the Nebraska cases are in Douglas County. There have now been 1,989 confirmed cases in Hall County, 1,072 cases in Dawson County and 2,183 cases in Dakota County. There are now 220 cases in Gage County and 6,010 cases in Lancaster County.
