RE: Daily COVID-19 Update

Good morning! The number of new cases of COVID-19 in our area and in the state continue to go down, which is the only way we are going to get control of the new mutations of the virus that are showing up around the world. The more cases of the disease that are out there the greater the chance that this virus will mutate again so please continue doing what you are doing to prevent the spread.

Again, I want to remind you that we will be administering vaccinations to a group of 75+ year olds today and Thursday so please leave the parking spots on both sides in front of the Cardiac Rehab entrance open for these folks. If you see a safety concern or other obstacle that might interfere with these people safely accessing our facility, please let someone know.

As of 9:00 this morning there were 107,011,739 cases in the world. Yesterday there were 106,578,933. There have been 2,343,666 deaths. Yesterday there had been 2,327,985 deaths.

In the United States there are now 27,193,849 positive cases and 468,217 deaths. Yesterday there were 27,098,933 cases and 465,096 deaths. There were 94,916 new cases diagnosed yesterday and 3,121 deaths.

In Nebraska there are now 194,514 cases and there have been 1,978 deaths. Yesterday there had been 194,170 positive cases and 1,968 deaths. 344 new confirmed cases have been identified since yesterday and 109 of those cases were in Douglas County. We now have had 709 confirmed cases in Nemaha County, 199 in Pawnee County, 658 in Richardson County, 624 in Johnson County and 1,255 in Otoe County. These are the numbers of cases in each county as reported by the Southeast District Health Department. 62,181 of the Nebraska cases are in Douglas County. There have now been 6,804 confirmed cases in Hall County, 2,718 cases in Dawson County and 3,667 cases in Dakota County. There are now 2,026 cases in Gage County and 27,204 cases in Lancaster County.
